





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## Introduction

The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation (SHF) is a Crown Agency with a mandate to invest in the conservation of Saskatchewan's unique history. The SHF's strategic direction is entrusted to a Board of Directors appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and its day-to-day operations are carried out by staff from the Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport.

## **Hision**

We imagine a future in which Saskatchewan residents are engaged and aware of the value of heritage in contributing to sustainable communities and a richer sense of place. Through meaningful and strategic investment in the heritage resources of Saskatchewan, the Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation motivates a collaborative approach to heritage conservation that heightens understanding and appreciation of our diverse heritage. The connection between heritage, community identity, pride and quality of life is embraced. Our vision is realized through strong private and public partnerships.

### Mission

The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation's mission is to foster conservation of and engagement with the heritage resources that embody Saskatchewan's heritage for the benefit of present and future generations.

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## **B**oard of Directors

Board of Directors: The affairs of the Foundation are directed by a board of private citizens, consisting of not less than seven and not more than fifteen persons, appointed by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council and drawn from communities across the province. Members can serve up to three consecutive 2-year terms. During the 2014-2015 fiscal year, Wesley Moore of Prince Albert and Royce Pettyjohn of Maple Creek served as Chair and Jennifer Hoesgen of Watson and Charlie Pirie of Balgonie as Vice-Chair. Dr. William Waiser and Dr. Elizabeth Robertson resigned from the Board, leaving the board with a complement of nine members.

## Summary of Achievements

Over the past fiscal year, the Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation has continued to make investments in the stabilization and rehabilitation of heritage buildings formally designated under the *Heritage Property Act (2010)*. The Foundation continued to invest in archeological explorations and provided financial assistance for both the Youth Heritage Fairs and *les Journées du patrimoine*.

The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation unveiled a new one-time grant program for non-designated commercial properties. As well, the Foundation continued to work with the Meewasin Valley Authority to ensure the First Nations' Central Burial Site near Saskatoon received the maintenance and care that site needed, and of course, the care and maintenance of the Claybank Brick Plant National Historic Site, near Avonlea, which is owned by the Foundation, on behalf of the Crown.

## Saskatchewan Heritage Fairs

The first Regional Heritage Fair was held in Saskatoon in 1997, and Regina followed a year later. Formed in the Spring of 2000, the Saskatchewan Youth Heritage Fair Association Inc. (SYHFA) was composed of persons from the Regional Heritage Fairs and the Ministry of Education. Students undertake hands-on, independent research projects and present them at annual school-based Regional Fairs. In all jurisdictions, winners at Regional Fairs are selected to compete at an annual Provincial Fair. In late summer 2013, the responsibility of the Youth Heritage Fair program was turned over to Heritage Saskatchewan for further administration.

In 2014, the Foundation provided a grant of \$1,500 for Regional Fairs in each of the following communities: Moose Jaw, Regina and Saskatoon. At the school level, some 1,753 students participated in preparing 1,389 projects; at the regional level, 333 students displayed 274 projects.

In 2014, the Foundation also provided a grant of \$5,000 for hosting a provincial heritage fair Showcase to Heritage Saskatchewan. The (May 2014) Showcase in Regina, which profiled the student winners of the Regional Fairs, involved 38 student representatives from schools across the province, with 33 projects on display.

The Claybank Brick Plant celebrated its 100th Anniversary with an extra special Heritage Day event held in June of 2014. Approximately 700 people enjoyed a day filled with hands-on heritage opportunities. Former employees returned to the brick plant to operate the historic machinery including a dry pan crusher, an AB brick press, and a line shaft system that powered the brick plant's machine shop. The AB brick press was purchased in 1912 and produced the first bricks at the brick plant, and also pressed the last bricks before the plant closure in 1989. Hay wagon rides travelled up into the historic clay pits where a narration highlighting the clay deposits, natural area, and associated First Nations history could be heard. The Lil' Jigger railway rides were also very popular and included an extension hay wagon ride to the village of Claybank to take in the historic cemetery and St. Joseph's church that is faced with Claybank brick. Other heritage demonstrations included: spinning wheel, flint napping, potters wheel, brick laying, rope making, and more. Homemade Saskatoon Berry pie was available as well as entertainment for children.

The Claybank Brick Plant is a tribute to the ingenuity and rigor of Saskatchewan's early settlers. Touring the site facilitates a greater sense of pride in our heritage and in our countries' rich history.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To: The Members of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2015 and the statements of operations and accumulated surplus and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards for Treasury Board's approval, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

Opinion

In my opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation as at March 31, 2015, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### March 31, 2015

#### 1. Authority

The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation (Foundation) was established under the authority of *The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation Act* effective February 18, 1991, as amended by *The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation Amendment Act*, 2001. In June 2010, *The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation Act* was repealed and its various sections were incorporated, via *The Streamlining Act*, into an amended, and expanded, *The Heritage Property Act*. The Foundation works in close consultation with the Heritage Conservation Branch of the Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport (Ministry). The Ministry may also provide funds to the Foundation for its operations. The Foundation provides financial support to individuals, municipalities, community-based organizations and businesses for various heritage initiatives which research, conserve, develop, interpret and promote Saskatchewan's rich heritage resources.

The Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation Board oversees the Foundation. The Minister of Parks, Culture and Sport appoints board members.

Since its inception in 1991, the Foundation has acquired a number of provincially significant historic artifacts through donation and purchase. Those historic artifacts are not recorded in these financial statements.

#### 2. Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards. A statement of changes in net financial assets has not been prepared as the information is readily determinable from the other statements. These statements do not present a Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses as the Foundation has no remeasurement gains or losses. The following policies are considered significant:

#### a) Heritage Properties

The cost incurred to restore and develop the Claybank Brick Plant is expensed in the year the services are rendered and/or goods received.

Other heritage projects that the Foundation supports are recorded as an expense when recipients incur eligible expenses for projects approved by the Foundation Board.

Donated heritage properties, materials and services are not recorded.

Heritage properties purchased by the Foundation are expensed when acquired.

#### b) Revenue

Transfers are recognized as revenue when the transfers are authorized and any eligibility criteria are met. Transfers not recognized as revenue are recorded as deferred revenue.

#### 3. Due From General Revenue Fund

The Foundation's bank accounts are included in the Consolidated Offset Bank Concentration arrangement for the Government of Saskatchewan.

The Foundation's earned interest is calculated and paid by the Government's General Revenue Fund on a quarterly basis using the Government's thirty day borrowing rate and the Foundation's average daily bank account balance. The Government's average thirty day borrowing rate for 2015 is .92% (2014 – 1.02%).

#### 4. Claybank Brick Plant

The Claybank Brick Plant (Plant), including land, was donated to the Foundation in 1992. In 1994, the Plant was designated as a National Historic Site, and as a Provincial Heritage Property in 1998. The Foundation incurs conservation and management costs and seeks contributions from other organizations to offset a portion of those costs.

The Claybank Brick Plant Historical Society (Society) donates material and services to the Foundation to achieve the common goal of preserving the Brick Plant as a nationally significant heritage property and tourist attraction. The Foundation has a co-operating agreement with the Society which requires that some funds acquired by the Society, depending on how they are received and for what purpose, shall be directed to the Foundation.

#### 5. Kaplan Funds

The J.M. Kaplan Fund is a philanthropic family foundation, based in New York, which administers a conservation program to help restore and protect aspects of the natural and historic legacies of the North American continent. Since 2002, the Kaplan Fund has approved five separate allocations to the Foundation, totalling \$277,429, for preserving historic churches and other heritage sites. The Kaplan Fund has agreed to match any funds approved by the Foundation for heritage conservation projects. The grant recipient must then at least match the amounts they may receive from the Foundation including the Kaplan Fund amount. Total Kaplan dollars expensed to date is \$ 277,429 with \$ 0 remaining in deferred revenue.

#### 6. Financial Instruments

The Foundation's financial instruments include due from General Revenue Fund, accounts receivable, interest receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities. The fair value of these instruments approximates carrying value due to their immediate or short-term nature. These instruments have no interest risk, credit risk, liquidity risk or market risk.

#### 7. Budget

The Foundation Board approved the 2014/2015 budget at their May 1 - 4, 2014 Board meeting.

#### 8. Related Party Transactions

Included in these financial statements are transactions with various Saskatchewan Crown corporations, ministries, agencies and boards related to the Foundation by virtue of common control by the Government of Saskatchewan. Also, the Foundation is related to non-Crown enterprises that the Government jointly controls or significantly influences.

Routine operating transactions with related parties are recorded at rates charged by those organizations and are settled on normal trade terms.

The Foundation pays Provincial Sales Tax to the Saskatchewan Ministry of Finance on all its taxable purchases. Taxes paid are recorded as part of the cost of those purchases.

In accordance with established Government practice, the Foundation has not been charged with certain administrative and occupancy costs and no provision for such costs is reflected in these financial statements. These costs are borne by the Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport, from monies appropriated by the Legislature for such purposes.

Other transactions with related parties and amounts due to or from them are described separately in the financial statements and related notes.

#### 9. Commitments

The Foundation has multi-year commitments at year end totaling \$ 254,162 (2014 - \$ 297,052) for various approved heritage projects. The Foundation Board has approved these projects but no monies have been paid or eligible expenses incurred.
